water is the key.






- Wilmslow Wells for Africa is formed as an 'Enterprise' under the Wilmslow Council of Churches.
- An appeal letter letter is sent out and a bank account is opened.
- After three unsuccessful drillings, water is discovered in Jericho WWfA's first project.
- Brenda Mottershead becomes the founding Chair.








 Rosemary Stubbs designs a notelet, 'Water Carriers beneath the Hot Sun', to raise funds. It is a lino cut over which she printed the sun by hand and is subsequently developed to become the charity's logo.





- First well is completed at Jericho, in the Bophuthatswana Homeland of South Africa where Emily Maloka lived.
- First 'Auction of Talents and Services' held these ran until 1995 raising over £30,000.









- Wilmslow Wells for Africa registered with the Charity Commission (No. 328330)
- WWfA's funds its tenth project at the AGM, a cheque for £1,000 is presented by the Trustees
  to Len Apfel, WWfA's representative in Africa in the early years.





- First WWfA Christmas card is produced they are now well established.
- Rosemary Stubbs and Beryl Jones have contributed many card designs over the years and all
  have been printed at no cost to WWfA by James Townsley of Printforce meaning all proceeds
  go directly into projects. The cards are either sold directly or through the Charity Card Shop.









- The first 'Souperday' takes place at Birtles Vicarage raising £300.
- Souperdays have continued twice yearly ever since raising nearly £70,000 in total. They offer a
  choice of home-made soups with bread. The cake and produce stall is always popular.










- Marion Jones becomes Chair.
- 'A Story of Trust' is published telling the story of the first six years of Wilmslow Wells.
- The book is dedicated to Len Apfel, a retired aid worker, based in South Africa where Brenda met him. WWfA's 'Man in Africa', he supervised the first 12 projects and now stood down.






- Annus horribilis! Having linked with separate national charities on two large projects which proved unsatisfactory, the future survival of Wilmslow Wells was under serious threat.
- The General Committee is widened to include more non-church people and the trustees develop new internal rules for their work.
- These still apply and are as follows:
- Only engage with projects when we are assured that funds are available
- Focus on smaller projects rather than being part of someone else's large one
- Try to put our funds to use promptly rather than sitting on money in the bank
- Widen our contact base of partner organisations to ensure a steady flow of suitable projects where we are providing all the funds



- First Gardens Day takes place in August with 14 gardens, 200 tickets sold and £500 raised.
- Gardens Day has expanded to regularly attract about 1000 visitors and raise nearly £20,000.
- First projects in Mozambique, Kenya and Uganda.









- Len Apfel dies in September
- WWfA celebrates it's 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary having completed 16 projects in four countries.






- Brenda Mottershead awarded the MBE in New Year's Honours.

- First Barn Dance & Supper takes place these remained popular fundraisers for several years








- Joanna Southgate becomes Chair.
- At special meeting, Sister Monica describes problems of running a training novitiate for young women under a Nigerian dictatorship. WWfA funds a water storage project for the novitiate.













eight children to water-related diseases and she offered one of her surviving children to Brenda to take back to England for the chance of a better life.



#### Wells for Africa garden event raises £10,000

HUNDREDS of visitors attended the 21st Wilmslow Wells for Africa Gardens Day in aid of charity.

The day, which raised nearly £10,000 for African water projcets, featured 17 private gardens in Wilmslow and Alderley Edge open to the public.

It attracted 560 people who visited gardens during the day.

The event raised more than £9,600 for the Wilmslow Wells for Africa charity, which has raised £850,000 for clean water projects in rural Africa since it was formed around 30 years ago.

Helen Battilana, chairman, said: "We are thrilled with the response to our 21st Gardens Day.

"Our charity is grateful for the generosity of the gardeners and to everyone who supported us.

"The trustees meet next week to decide how to spend the money raised. We have several potential projects in Uganda and Kenya to consider."







- Liz Maddock delivers the breads she has made for the Autumn Souperday for the final time after doing it for 25 years!








- WWfA celebrates its 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Over 350 projects South Sudan becomes 20th country.
